Annual NOPD Citizens
Satisfaction Survey 2025



Survey information

- Survey was conducted May 27-June 4, 2025, under the direction of Ronald A. Faucheux, Ph.D., CEO of Faucheux Strategies, LLC, New Orleans and Washington, D.C.
- Survey based on a representative sample of completed interviews with 800 adults (18 and older) in the City of New Orleans.
- Interviews conducted by live, professionally trained telephone interviewers via cell phones (81%) and landlines (19%).
- Margin of error for full sample: +/- 3.46%.
- Because of rounding, some of the data columns do not add up to 100%.
- Racial composition of sample: 57% African American, 35% white, 8% other. Sample targets and weights based on census data.

Overview of key findings

NOPD SATISFACTION: Overall satisfaction with the NOPD went up 7 points since last year, 40% to 47%.

- Residents saying they are "very satisfied" with the NOPD more than doubled since last year, going from 4% to 9%.
 - Anne Kirkpatrick took office as police chief in 2023, when the NOPD's satisfaction rating was 31%. It's increased 16 points since then.
- There is a widening gap on NOPD satisfaction by age, growing from 16 points last year to 21 points this year. Younger residents are less satisfied with the NOPD.
- The NOPD's satisfaction rating among Black residents increased 6 points since the last survey, from 46% to 52%, and the NOPD's satisfaction rating among White residents increased 8 points, from 32% to 40%.
- Satisfaction with NOPD's work in residents' own neighborhoods is up 4 points from last year (58% to 62%). The age gap has grown to 22 points.

CRIME PERCEPTIONS: A majority of city residents (54%) now say the **city is safe**; that's an 11-point improvement from last year (43 to 51).

- 56% of Blacks and 49% of Whites say the city is safe. Compared to last year, that's up 6 points among Blacks and 17 points among Whites.
 - More men and older residents believe the city is safe than do women and younger people.
 - A big majority of residents, 84%, believe **their own neighborhood** is safe; that's 30 points higher than perceptions of the city-as-a-whole (54%).
- 35% perceive that the citywide crime problem has gotten better since last year and 37% perceive it's stayed the same; 26% think it's gotten worse.

NOPD TASK RATINGS: 12% to 34% of city residents positively rate tasks performed by the NOPD as "excellent" or "good." Even though these ratings remain very low—some alarmingly low—they've improved since last year when only 7% to 25% of residents positively rated NOPD on its tasks.

- The highest rated police task is "working with neighborhood and community groups" (34% rate NOPD positively on this, up from 25% last year).
- Currently, the lowest rated police task is **recruitment** of new officers (only 12% rate the NOPD positively).
- The NOPD's biggest improvement since last year is investigating and solving car jackings, car thefts and car break-ins ("excellent" and "good" went up 9 points) and working with neighborhood and community groups ("excellent" and "good" also went up 9 points).

Overview of key findings CONTINUED

NOPD COMPETENCE, CULTURE AND PERFORMANCE VALUES:

- Those saying NOPD competence and effectiveness has "improved" in recent years went up 10 points since last year (from 24% to 34%).
- Those saying NOPD's **internal culture** has "improved" in recent years went up 9 points since last year (from 25% to 34%).
- Performance values ratings went up in all three categories compared to last year:
 - Excellent + good ratings on **ethics and professionalism** went up 4 points.
 - Excellent + good ratings on **honesty and integrity** went up 6 points.
 - Excellent + good ratings on using appropriate force when apprehending suspect went up 8 points.

POLICE MISCONDUCT: Compared to a few years ago, 38% of residents perceive that police brutality and misconduct has "decreased," 10% perceive it's "increased" and 48% say it's "about the same."

• Of those who say brutality and misconduct "decreased," there is a 7-point racial difference (more Whites than Blacks say "decreased") and a 12-point age difference (more older than younger people say "decreased").

RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION OF OFFICERS:

- Only 12% positively rate NOPD's efforts at **recruiting** new police officers; that's down 5 points from 17% last year. This is the only task rating that worsened.
- Only 13% positively rate NOPD's **retention** of existing police officers; that's up 3 points from last year.

PROPOSALS TO REDUCE CRIME: Big majorities of city residents, between 68% to 93%, favor eight proposals aimed at reducing crime that deal with investigations, manpower, police pay, social and counseling programs, tracking crime suspects, use of computer analytics, camera technology and facial recognition. Since last year, support for seven of these eight proposals went up, while one stayed the same.

Overview of key findings CONTINUED

PRISON ESCAPE: 65% of New Orleans residents believe **poor management** of the prison was the cause of the recent jailbreak; only 19% believe the cause was the Sheriff's office not having enough funding.

- 66% of Whites and 65% of Blacks say poor management of the prison was the cause of the recent jailbreak.
- A majority of city residents (57%) say the job done by the NOPD tracking and apprehending inmates after they escaped from Parish Prison did not make them think any differently of the department. By a 32-to-7 margin, residents said how NOPD handled the situation made them think "better" of the NOPD as opposed to "worse." More Black residents, older residents and men think "better" of the NOPD because of how they handled the situation.

STATE POLICE ASSISTANCE IN NEW ORLEANS: A solid majority of city residents (59%) think the temporary State Police handling of certain local policing duties in New Orleans is "working well." Only 27% say it's "not working well."

More Blacks than Whites (by 6 points) say it's "working well." More older people than younger people (by 19 points) say it's "working well."

CRIME STOPPERS: New Orleans residents who would "definitely" or "probably" call Crime Stoppers remains very high, the same as last year, at 83%. The major reason why residents say they would **not** call Crime Stoppers is because they "just don't want to get involved."

CONTACT WITH NOPD OFFICER: 41% of residents say they had contact with an NOPD officer over the past year. That's higher than in last year's survey (37%). More Whites, younger people and men say they have had contact with a police officer than do Blacks, older people and women.

Of those who say they have had contact with an officer, 70% were satisfied with the contact.

CIVIC PRIORITIES AND POLICYMAKERS: Results from additional survey questions related to broader civic issues will be released later this week. These will include ranking of issues and public official job ratings.





•	Overall satisfaction with the NOPD is now higher than it was in 2022, 2023 or 2024. It went up 7 points
	from last year, 40% to 47%.

- Those saying "very satisfied" more than doubled since last year, going from 4% to 9%.
- Anne Kirkpatrick took office as police chief in 2023, and that year the NOPD satisfaction rating was 31%.
 It's increased 16 points since then.
- There are widening differences on NOPD satisfaction by age, growing from 16 points last year to 21 points this year. Last year, the differences on race were 14 points, now it's 12 points.
- Comparing the 2025 survey to the 2024 survey, the NOPD satisfaction rating among Black residents increased 6 points, from 46% to 52%, and the satisfaction rating among White residents increased 8 points, from 32% to 40%.

NOPD: Job performance compared to a few years ago

- City residents saying the NOPD is doing a "better job" than in prior few years has steadily increased from 9% in 2023 to 27% in 2024 to 38% this year.
- This year, "Better job" beats "worse job" by nearly a 4-to-1 margin.
- The biggest gap is age, at 9 points, up from 6 points last year.

Crime problem in New Orleans: Better or worse

Over the last year, would you say the crime problem in New Orleans has gotten worse, gotten better OR is the same?

- In last year's survey, 28% of residents said the crime problem had gotten better over the prior year. In this new survey, 35% say it's gotten better, a 7-point improvement.
- A total of 72% say the crime problem has either stayed the same or has gotten better.
- News stories about a reduction of crime rates in key areas seems to have had an impact on public perceptions.
- The biggest demographic gap is between men and women, 12 points.



[•] A majority of city residents (54%) now say the city is safe—an 11-point improvement over last year's survey when it was 43%.

- In last year's survey, 50% of Blacks and 32% of Whites said the city was safe—now, 56% of Blacks and 49% of Whites say the city is safe.
- Of those who now say the city is safe, the racial gap is 7 points, the age gap is 19 points and the gender gap is 12 points.



On a scale of excellent, good, only fair or poor—how would you rate the New Orleans Police Department in the following areas…?




NOPD: Competence and effectiveness

- Residents saying NOPD competence and effectiveness has "improved" went up 10 points since last year's survey (going from 24% to 34%).
- The gender difference on this question is 15 points (more men than women say "improved") and the generation gap is 20 points (more older people than younger people say "improved).


NOPD: Police brutality and misconduct

- By nearly a 4-to-1 margin, residents say police brutality and misconduct has decreased more than increased over the past few years.
- Of those who now say brutality and misconduct has "decreased," there is a 7-point racial difference (more Whites say "decreased") and a 12-point age difference (more older people say "decreased.")

Those saying police brutality and misconduct have **decreased** over the past few years




Parish Prison Escape: Poor management or inadequate funding?

Those saying **poor management** of the prison was the cause of the jailbreak




NOPD and the prison escape

- By 32-to-7 margin, residents said it made them think "better" of the NOPD as opposed to "worse."
- A 57% majority of city residents say the NOPD's tracking down and apprehending inmates after they escaped from Parish Prison did not make them think any differently of the department.
- More Black residents, older residents and men think "better" of the NOPD than do White, women and younger residents.




State police handling local policing in New Orleans



EPIC: Awareness, accomplishing goal
